

# Letter from the Chair of Governors – Mrs Belinda Hansford

On behalf of the Governing Body, I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report to Parents for 2021/2022. The report itself is again shorter than usual to reflect the limitations of this last school year.

I have to start this report by recognising what another difficult year this has been for staff, pupils, and parents, although it was felt at the beginning that the threat of Covid was past it did raise its head again during the Autumn and Spring terms requiring a return to some Covid measures. In some ways this period was more difficult than the full lockdowns as the school had to make some difficult decisions around what to go ahead with and this lead to us not being able to have the usual Christmas activities of concerts and shows.

During the year Mr Saer was absent due to ill health for an extended period, but we were very fortunate to have an excellent Deputy in Mr Simon Short who stepped into the role and ensured the smooth running of the school. This was carried out with the able support of Mrs Tracy Burnell our Office Manager who ensured that all the administrative detail of the school was efficiently handled.

As usual the rest of the staff also stepped up to ensure that everything went well and that pupils continued to have excellent teaching and care at our school. We were pleased to welcome two PGCE students for part of the year and plan to continue with this over the next school year.

On behalf the Governors I would like to thank everyone for their support.

Along with a return to many of the activities for pupils it was an excellent year for the school as staff worked with pupils to both assess and remedy any losses in provision due to Covid. A large number of pupils have been able to participate in sports during the year with a very wide range on offer as can be read in this report.

Attendance has seen some reductions in our usual high levels, but the school is working to get this back to our pre-Covid levels.

The school continues to support the wellbeing of pupils and as well as outdoor learning, there has been counselling support available which has been used as required.

We are also pleased that Childplay are continuing to offer afternoon nursery and after school club to support parents' childcare needs.

Over the last few years access to school has been limited for governors and has meant that we continued to have our regular meetings via Teams. We are currently running with two vacancies – one for a co-opted and one for an LEA Governor; if anyone know of anyone interested in such a role (not a current parent) then do contact the school office.

As I enter my 5<sup>th</sup> year as Chair of Governors, I am proud to be associated with the school.

#### PUPIL ASSESSMENTS

As was the case during the pandemic, there were no end of Foundation Phase or Key Stage 2 Outcomes/Levels, as per Welsh Government guidance, however the school completed a number of teacher assessments including some summative tests in order to inform planning and gadge pupil progression.

#### ATTENDANCE

Due to COVID attendance data was not gathered and assessed during the year, however it is fair to say that on the whole at the times when attendance was possible our levels were very encouraging.

#### **Basic Information and Curriculum**

Crwys Primary is a school that delivers the Curriculum in English. During the year 2020/21 the school has been delivering the curriculum according to the Donaldson guidelines and the four core purposes. All major subjects are currently covered, and full information can be found in the School Prospectus. Information covering specific areas is outlined below.

During the second lockdown the school provided a range of resources based on age and need, overall, the take up was stronger than in the first lockdown. On the return to school in March there was again a key focus on supporting pupil catch up and ensuring that outdoor opportunities were taken advantage of.

#### School Prospectus

#### Outdoor Schools

Outdoor learning is, as before, a key focus for the school, pupils visit either Dukefield Woods or Priors Meadow Wood on a weekly basis.

The school's outdoor provision was highlighted by Estyn as highly effective; 'The use of outdoor learning to enhance pupils' attitudes to learning and improve their wellbeing is excellent and this ensures that pupils are developing into confident learners.' In addition, the case study has been recognised as effective practice at Consortia and Local Authority level.

Following the completion of the Erasmus project, the school has obtained funding for a further twoyear project. The focus will be on delivering the new curriculum in an outdoor environment.

In March, Mr Saer gave a presentation on Outdoor Learning to the Local Authority's Education & Skills Policy Development Committee.

#### Welsh Language Provision

Welsh language provision received very positive feedback from the Estyn Inspection and improvements in provision have both seen pupils' progress. During the year, the school has worked on the Siarter laith/Language Charter and following an assessment early in June was amongst the first schools in the area to receive the Welsh Charter Bronze Award. Pupils Voice in the form of an

elected 'Criw Cymraeg' have been encouraging and highlighting where Welsh can be used throughout the school and they were interviewed for the Charter Assessment.

#### **Special Teaching Facility**

The Facility caters for children with special educational needs and is supported by regular visits from speech therapists, the school psychological service, welfare officers and the school doctor. The Facility has a special place within the school and wider community and pupils are integrated into the mainstream classes whenever possible.

#### **Physical Education at Crwys Primary**

A Crwys tradition we strive to uphold is the importance of sport to help develop the 'whole' child In the Summer term we were able to have a Sports Day with spectators. The events were enjoyed by all the children. Children were also able to participate, where Covid allowed, in Football matches, Oakley House Gala, Cross Country, Kwik Cricket Festival, Area Athletics, and Hockey Matches Some pupils attended Sports Young Ambassador Training. Guest coaches also attended school to offer training in Dodge Ball and Rugby. Foundation Phase pupils have also been able to attend the Swansea Gymnastics Centre.

#### Healthy School

Crwys Primary School is very involved in the Swansea Health Promoting Schools Scheme. UNCRC – Article 24 – Your right to good food and water All food and drink prepared for the children during school time and After School Club is expected to follow Swansea County Council healthy eating guidelines. During break times we have a 'fruit only' policy, as decided upon by the School Council. Children may either purchase a piece of fruit from our 'Fruit Tuckshop' or bring their own from home.

We ask parents of children who bring a packed lunch to school to make every effort to ensure that the packed lunch contains a healthy eating and drinking selection. This is consistent with our Health Promoting Policy. Staff are also encouraged to follow Healthy Schools guidelines.

Drinking water – Drinking plenty of cold, fresh water helps to develop concentration skills and the well-being of the individual. We ensure that our children have access to cold, fresh drinking water throughout the school day. Our Healthy Schools co-ordinator is Mrs Rachel Harris. We have already received the 5<sup>th</sup> leaf as part of the Welsh Network of Healthy School Schemes.

#### **Rights Respecting Schools**

Article 2 - All children have these rights no matter what!

At Crwys Primary we've been working hard this term to become a Rights Respecting School. The Rights Respecting Schools Award is a programme run by UNICEF that aims to put children's rights at the centre of education in the UK. This involves embedding children's rights into the ethos and culture of the school in order to improve the pupils' wellbeing.

The school had the Platinum Eco Flag renewed during this year.

#### **Staff Training and Insets**

A range of training has taken place preparing teachers for the new curriculum, Welsh and ALN provision alongside the usual refreshers in Fire Safety etc.

In addition during this year we welcomed two PGCE students to term on placements, both of which were completed successfully.

#### **Premises**

During lockdown Mr Collins continued with the programme of redecorating the school and in the Summer Term continued with work on the outdoor areas. The PTA secured additional benches to enhance the yard.

#### **Toilet Facilities:**

The toilets are in a good state of repair and are cleaned regularly by the school cleaner. During COVID there has been increased provision for handwashing in all areas.

#### Links to the Community

This school year saw the return of the Fete which was well attended with good weather. The Governors continue to support the inclusion of news about the school in the Village Newsletter. The School also works with the Crwys District Sports Association in the use of the Crwys Woodland for school activities.

#### Parent Teacher Association

The PTA managed to raise through a number of activities a total of £4578 was raised and funds were provided to the school to develop the outdoor areas, as well as an online phonics programme for the younger pupils and an online maths programme for Junior pupils
